

Major, Dr. Omar D. Blair

Who was Omar D. Blair?

Major (Retired) USAF, Dr. Omar D. Blair, Husband, Father, Grandfather, Uncle, Friend and Community Leader

Omar was born in Houston, Texas to Omar O. Blair and Lillian Ballard Blair. Omar attended public schools in Denver, Colorado, Albuquerque, New Mexico and Phoenix, Arizona. He returned to Albuquerque for high school, graduating in 1936. He graduated with honors in spite of racially negative experiences. In 1979, Omar received the "Most Distinguished Graduate of Albuquerque High School, 1879 to 1979.

He was an Original Tuskegee Airmen, part of the 332nd Fighter Group and the 99th Pursuit Squadron. While he was never a pilot at 6'4' tall, Omar was in charge of logistics and procurement of supplies to support bomber missions.

The "Great Train Robbery" was the event Omar and his unit were best known for after WWII. This event enabled an important mission escorting bombers to

Berlin. This mission was successful and became a pivotal event in the war.

Omar was a servant leader always ready to accept a call for public service. From 1968 to 1978, Omar was appointed to the Denver Urban Renewal Authority as a commissioner charged with improving downtown Denver, the 16th Street Mall and the business community.

A strong advocate for quality education in the Denver Public Schools, Omar was one of three members elected to the Board of Education in 1973. He served the community for twelve years from 1973 to 1985. During his tenure, Omar was elected Vice President from 1975 to 1977 and became the first African American President of the Board from 1977 to 1985. During his tenure the district opened the Career Education Center, built the original Montbello High School, opened or renovated a dozen schools around the district, and increased technology for students throughout the district.


The recognition of a life well-lived was honored with three unique facilities

- 1997 Dedication of the Omar D. Blair Fellowship Hall by the congregation of Shorter Community AME Church
- 2003 Dedication of the Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library of the Denver Public Library
- 2004 Dedication of the Omar D. Blair K-8 School by the Denver Public Schools located in Green Valley Ranch

Omar received numerous awards including the following

- 1975 **National Organization for Women -**"Presented a certificate of merit to Omar Blair because he wished to recognize "**her**" achievements in advancing the equality of women."
- 1979 The Most Distinguished Graduate
 Albuquerque High School, 1879 to 1979
- 1984 Metropolitan State College bestowed

 Degree of Doctor of Public Service, Honoris Causa
- 2001 Martin Luther King, Jr.
 Business Social Responsibility Award



Family Legacy

Omar was a hero to many, a great friend to some, a wonderful companion, father and grandfather and would have loved his great-grandchildren. He had nicknames for family and friends including his beloved wife, Jeweldine also known as "Child Bride." He nicknamed his daughters: Deborah C. "Muffet," and Patricia "Tweety Bird" or "Little Bear" and son, Omar D. III "Drew-eee". The grandchildren received favored names too. Lisa "Little Troop" and "Dr. Lisa," Christopher "Spike," Daniel "Danielson," Erik "Viking", Valerie "Val-O-Rie."

We know he would have special names for each of the great-grands: Addison and Isla; Duke, Lucy, Deacon and Mia.

As a grandfather, Omar loved his grandchildren unconditionally. He encouraged them to dream big, set high goals and expectations. He would be very proud of the accomplishments of Lisa, Daniel, Erik and Valerie. The great-grandchildren would have a multitude of nicknames and would enjoy his special brand of spoiling.


The Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library is located in the <u>Five Points</u> neighborhood of <u>Denver</u>. Named for **Omar Blair** and <u>Elvin Caldwell</u>, two prominent local civil rights leaders, it is the largest of <u>Denver Public Library</u>'s neighborhood branches and one of only five Black research libraries in American public library systems. It includes a circulating collection, a unique assortment of artifacts and documents chronicling the contribution of Black people to the city of Denver and the American West, and a museum and exhibit space.

Introducing young people across the nation to the world of aviation, aerospace, mathematics and science through local programs such as the Mile High Flight Program.


